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Sip a Singapore Sling in Singapore

Let's lay down the ground rules here early folks, a true Singapore Sling needs to contain the following: gin, cherry brandy, Cointreau, grenadine, pineapple juice, fresh lime juice, a dash of Angostura bitters and garnished with a wedge of pineapple. There, I said it. I have drawn the proverbial line in the sand.

There are admittedly many funky new variations of the old classic which was pioneered at the Raffles Hotel Singapore in 1915, but this next flurry of advice is designed for those seeking to sample the best version of the real McCoy, not some bizarre hipster variant served up inside a bouquet of bitter kale leaves.

So, if you want to drink the best Singapore Sling, it stands to reason that Singapore is where you will find the best version of this glorious libation. One of the best places to go is where it all began at the Raffles Hotel. There you can pull up a seat at the Long Bar and try the cocktail made from the very best

ingredients, including a range of premium gins and custom-made grenadine syrup. A warning though, trying the real thing is not the cheapest option, with each glass likely to cost you around A\$30-35.

Another great place to grab a Singapore Sling is the Smoke and Mirrors bar located at the top of the National Gallery overlooking the Marina Bay. Here the cocktail has a slightly different take, even the name (Robbery at the Museum), with fermented pineapple tepache replacing the juice and Maraschino liqueur subbing in for the cherry brandy.

For a more homely vibe, check out the Tess Bar & Kitchen located only around the corner from the Raffles Hotel, or for something a little bit different, the Court Martial Bar also serves up a mean Singapore Sling, complete with an austere military motif throughout. *Clink, cheers!

Virgin 2.0 unveiled

Virgin Australia is set to emerge from voluntary administration with a firm focus on its core strengths, "re-establishing itself as an iconic Australian airline".

That's the key promise of plans revealed by CEO Paul Scurrah last week, with the airline to reduce staff and simplify its fleet under its new Bain Capital ownership.

The airline will cease operating its ultra low-cost Tigerair Australia offshoot, and long-haul international flights are off the agenda at this stage - although Scurrah does envisage the eventual return of operations to Japan and the USA.

"Demand for domestic and short-haul international travel is likely to take at least three years to return to pre-COVID-19 levels, with the real chance it could be longer, which means as a business we must make changes to ensure the Virgin Australia Group is successful in this new world," Scurrah said.

Cruise pause extended

The resumption of global cruising is a little further off after Cruise Lines International Association last week announced it was extending the voluntary pause of US operations by its members until 31 October.

However some green

shoots of recovery are beginning to appear, with authorities in Europe giving approval over the weekend for a limited restart.

MSC Cruises, Costa Cruises and Aida Cruises have all confirmed recommencements of cruising in the Mediterranean under strict protocols, in most cases only carrying European guests.

The planned resumptions come despite cases of COVID-19 being detected during the voyages of some early adopters including Hurtigruten, SeaDream, Paul Gauguin and Uncruise Adventures.

The global cruise industry says it's learning and adapting from these cases, with the ultimate aim of making cruising safe for all.

Cycling adventures

Exploring a destination on two wheels allows travellers to soak up the views on an active adventure, whilst satisfying the need for a hit of adrenalin. Jasmine Hanna dives in to unpack some of Australia and New Zealand's iconic cycling adventures.




Alps 2 Ocean Cycle Trail, Aoraki/Mt Cook - Oamaru

The Alps 2 Ocean Trail stretches more than 300km from the mountains to sea and is New Zealand's longest continuous cycle trail. It ventures from Aoraki/Mt Cook through the hydro-lakes of the Mackenzie Country and lush farmland of the Waitaki Valley. The trail winds through diverse landscapes, small towns and rural settlements with friendly pubs and cafés as well as unique and local accommodation. It can be stretched across six days or broken up into smaller segments. There is plenty to do off the bike, such as a soak in steaming hot tubs, wine tasting in the Waitaki vineyards, star gazing under the incredible night sky, and exploring the towering clay cliffs.

Hawkes Bay Trails, Hawkes Bay

The extensive Hawke's Bay Trail network follows smooth, cross-country paths and quiet back roads. The tracks can provide one- to four-day adventures and are a memorable way to reach Hawke's Bay's wineries and other sights, enjoying breathtaking coastal and rural views along the way. Themed trails include the Landscapes Ride that takes in relaxed seaside settlements, dramatic views of Cape Kidnappers and the bucolic Tukituki Valley. The Wineries Ride winds between the vineyards around Hastings and Flaxmere with ample opportunity for tastings, while art deco Napier can be explored on the Water Ride that also showcases coastal, wetland and riverside scenery. There are also day-trip options, including a picturesque riverside loop from Napier

out to the charming Puketapu pub, and the coastal ride from the East Clive Wetlands to the wineries around Te Awanga.

Queen Charlotte Track, Marlborough

This classic mountain biking adventure leads riders through the Marlborough Sounds, one of New Zealand's most beautiful waterways. The journey starts with a scenic boat cruise from Picton to historic Ship Cove in the outer reaches of the Sounds, from where the trail skirts around bay after bay, linked by saddles and ridges topped with impressive viewpoints. Offering a mix of intermediate and advanced riding, the track can be completed over two to three days by fit riders, or broken into shorter, leisurely sections with the assistance of regular water taxis. There's also the option to ferry

luggage between overnight stops including nature campsites and seafront lodges, with resort lunches, kayaking and hiking all on the cards.

Great Ocean Road, Victoria

The Great Ocean Road is billed as one of the world's most scenic coastal drives and is just as stunning on two wheels. The 243km stretch of road hugs the south-eastern coast of Australia between

the Victorian cities of Torquay and Allansford and weaves through attractions and natural wonders along the way. There are plenty of things to do and places to stop along the way, including the towering 12 Apostles, native wildlife, iconic surf breaks, pristine waterfalls and quaint seaside towns.

Munda Biddi Trail, Western Australia

Western Australia bills itself as a great place for a road trip, and the same goes for cycling. Diehard cyclists with a few weeks up their sleeve can tackle the 1,000km Munda Biddi Trail. The track stretches from just outside of Perth all the way to Albany through an undeveloped natural corridor. There is also the option to break up the trail into bite-sized pieces, visiting stunning coastal towns along the way.

Hunter Valley, NSW

Cycling is a great way to explore the Hunter Valley wineries, with a dedicated cycleway which runs from the New England Highway through to Broke Road, past many of the region's popular wineries. There are a number of hire options, ranging from mountain bikes and tandems to electric bikes. There is also the added benefit of the option for wine purchases to be delivered to Pokolbin accommodation, or the bike hire venue.

We wander the streets of a new city in fascination, but it must be said that some do it better than others. Some even make the streets themselves the attraction.



New York City

The Big Apple has a well-earned reputation for artistic endeavour, with many of its streets a shrine to its gritty origins as a home to countless struggling artists. Popular graffiti installations in New York include the affectionately named Bronx Wall of Fame, a long stretch of artistic energy where the likes of Long Island's Phetus and the late Iz the Wiz have painted its walls. Another great spot is The Bushwick Collective, a funky neighbourhood block dreamed up by local Joe Ficalora.

Bristol

Those Brits sure are a creative bunch, and it is on full display throughout the streets of Bristol. Amongst the array of historical architecture in this old-world city, travellers can tour the streets and absorb the highly dynamic modern street art that adorns many of its streets. Some sections are even famed for their everchanging status, with new murals and graffiti art painted weekly. To take full advantage of the bohemian vibe, try taking one of the many art walking tours on offer.





Berlin

Germany's modern-day reputation for being a global artistic hub is typified throughout the streets of bustling Berlin, with UNESCO even dubbing the European metropolis the "City of Design". In between ducking in and out of its hundreds of soughtafter museums, take a stroll through the streets to view some of its most iconic artworks. These include the giant Cosmonaut artwork by Victor Ash, a massive black print scribed on the side of an apartment building. The East Side Gallery is another must-see, comprised of hundreds of interesting art works etched into the longest surviving segment of the Berlin Wall.

Melbourne

Considered by many to be the cultural mecca of our great southern land, Melbourne is home to a plethora of vivid murals, sprawled throughout its many quirky back allies and narrow laneways. One of the best places to head to is Hosier Lane opposite Federation Square. Every nook and cranny of this street is a canvas, boasting brightly coloured artwork across the walls, windows, pavements, and even smaller objects like bollards and lamp posts.



Asian Fusion Cocktail

This week's recipe comes from APT. Their Queensland sales team came up with the recipe to celebrate cruising along the Mekong or Irrawaddy rivers. The cocktail's flavours will take you straight to Asia!

Ingredients

- 1 nip vodka (or more to your liking)
- 1 nip Lemongrass Cordial
- 1 cup (approximately) soda water Dash of water
- 3 or 4 mint leaves
- 1 stick lemongrass, bruised Lemon or lime slices (optional)

Method

In a cocktail shaker, add Vodka, lemongrass cordial, & lemongrass, top up with soda water and a dash of water. Add ice if desired. Stir it – don't shake it! Pour into a cocktail glass and add mint plus lemon or lime slices (optional).
